2017 Vermont Census of Advanced Practice Registered Nurses Summary Report



SUMMARY

- 617 APRNs worked in Vermont in 2017, including: *
 - 498 Nurse Practitioners
 - 34 Certified Nurse Specialists
 - 54 Certified Nurse Midwives
 - 46 Certified Nurse Anesthetists
- 88% (543) of the APRNs were female, 12% male.
- Ages ranged from 26 to 82, with a median of 50.

PRIMARY CARE

53% (328) worked mainly in primary care, including:

- 19% (115) in family health
- 13% (81) in adult health
- 12% (73) in women's health
- 6% (34) in pediatrics

There were 235.5 primary care Full Time Equivalents (FTEs)

- 37.7 per 100,000 population statewide

SPECIALTY CARE

47% (289) worked mainly in specialty care, including:

- 13% (78) in mental health
- 7% (45) in anesthesiology
- 6% (35) in acute, trauma or critical Care

There were 209.8 specialty care Full Time Equivalents (FTEs)

- 33.6 per 100,000 population statewide

SUMMARY (continued)


- 25% (81) of the APRNs in primary care, and 30%
 (87) of those in specialty care, are age 60 or older.
- Of those who work mainly in primary care, 48% (156) have worked as APRNs less than 10 years, and 25% (83) for 20 or more years.
- Of those who work mainly in specialty care, 42% (118) have worked as APRNs less than 10 years, and 28% (80) for 20 or more years.
- The median number of years worked as an APRN (anywhere) is 11, with 7 years in Vermont.

CHANGES OVER TIME: PRIMARY CARE

In 2017, as compared with the year 2015:


- APRNs in primary care increased from 276 to 328.
- APRNs in specialty care increased from 259 to 289.
- 27% of the APRNs are age 60 or more, as compared with 31% in 2015.
- 170 APRNs are younger than 40, as compared with 110 in 2015.

Age Distribution




The median age of all APRNs is 50

Age Distribution Over Time: 2017 vs. 2015




There are many more APRNs under 40 in 2017

Full Time Equivalents (FTEs) by County




APRNs are unevenly distributed around the state

Location of Training





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

Practice Setting




Patient Care Hours Per Week




Average hours per week: 30 in patient care, plus 7 hours in other activities
