		The following Performance Measure was discussed and edits were made to better communicate		
		how Goal 3 would be measured:		
		 As discussed: Number of prevention initiatives and services available and sustainably 		
		funded across Vermont's communities and schools. (Measures Goal #3 and is		
		measured through review of state and federal investments in prevention).		
		 Edited to read: Percentage of the cannabis excise tax, opioid settlement funds, 		
		Tobacco Master Settlement Agreement, and other state revenue allocated to		
		prevention programming (Measures Goal #3 and is measured through review of state and federal investments in prevention).		
		• It was raised that there should be one performance measure that reflects the SMPC directly.		
		Language was proposed on requiring the SMPC to meet with the Vermont Prevention Lead		
		Organizations and Tobacco grantees at least annually to learn about successes and potential		
		barriers to help inform future recommendations in SMPC reports.		
		Rhonda Williams proposed the following policy recommendation as informed by subcommittee		
		and full SMPC meetings:		
		 To promote prevention, develop, review, and update statutes to regulate all substances 		
		to ensure parity. Parity efforts could include, but not be limited to, addressing the		
		following:		
		 Requiring retailers to hold a separate retail license for each substance sold; Conducting regular youth enforcement checks; 		
		 Adhering to Drug Free School Zone (V.S.A. §4237) requirements by 		
		implementing and enforcing buffer zones of at least 500 feet from schools and		
		childcare centers;		
		 Establishing and maintaining concentration limits on substances for safety 		
		purposes (such as THC levels for all cannabis products, and nicotine levels for		
		tobacco products);		
		 Decreasing youth physical access (such as products behind the counter, 		
		reducing retail density, increasing enforcement of online sales);		
		 Banning price discounting (such as buy one and get one free, coupons); 		
		 Prohibiting packaging and promotions aimed at youth; and 		
		 Restricting flavors in all tobacco products. 		

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		 The SMPC members felt this was inclusive of priority topics, and allows the SMPC's recommendations for the legislature to be more proactive, rather than react in nature. 		
		 Voting will occur through an online survey; votes will be identifiable and will be publicly available.
