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INTRODUCTION

The Annual Synar Report (ASR) format provides the means for states to comply with the reporting provisions of the Public Health Service Act (42 U.S.C. 300x-26) and the Tobacco Regulation for the Substance Abuse Prevention and Treatment Block Grant (SABG) (45 C.F.R. 96.130 (e)).

How the Synar report helps the Center for Substance Abuse Prevention

In accordance with the tobacco regulations, states are required to provide detailed information on progress made in enforcing youth and young adult tobacco access laws (FFY 2024 Compliance Progress) and future plans to ensure compliance with the Synar requirements to reduce youth and young adult tobacco access rates (FFY 2025 Intended Use Plan). These data are required by 42 U.S.C. 300x-26 and will be used by the Secretary to evaluate state compliance with the statute. Part of the mission of the Center for Substance Abuse Prevention (CSAP) is to assist states¹ by supporting Synar activities and providing technical assistance helpful in determining the type of enforcement measures and control strategies that are most effective. This information is helpful to CSAP in improving technical assistance resources and expertise on enforcement efforts and tobacco control program support activities, including state Synar program support services, through an enhanced technical assistance program involving conferences and workshops, development of training materials and guidance documents, and onsite technical assistance consultation.

How the Synar report can help states

The information gathered for the Synar report can help states describe and analyze substate needs for program enhancements. These data can also be used to report to the state legislature and other state and local organizations on progress made to date in enforcing youth and young adult tobacco access laws when aggregated statistical data from state Synar reports can demonstrate to the Secretary the national progress in reducing youth and young adult tobacco access problems. This information will also provide Congress with a better understanding of state progress in implementing Synar, including state difficulties and successes in enforcing retailer compliance

with youth and young adult tobacco access laws.

Where and when to submit the Synar report

The ASR must be received by SAMHSA no later than December 31, 2024 and must be submitted in the format specified by these instructions. Use of the approved format will avoid delays in the review and approval process. The chief executive officer (or an authorized designee) of the applicant organization must sign page one of the ASR certifying that the state has complied with all reporting requirements.

The state must upload one copy of the ASR using the online WebBGAS (Block Grant Application System). In addition, the following items must be uploaded to WebBGAS:

- FFY 2025 Synar Survey Results: States that use the Synar Survey Estimation System (SSES) must upload one copy of SSES Tables 1-8 (in Excel) to WebBGAS. Please note that, in the FFY 2025 ASR, SSES will generate Tables 6, 7, and 8, which are based on the optional microdata on product type, retail outlet type, and whether identification was requested. If your state does not submit these optional data, Tables 6, 7, and 8 will be blank. Tables 6, 7, and 8 are generated for the convenience of the state, and states are not required to submit completed versions of Tables 6, 7, or 8. States that do not use SSES must upload one copy of ASR Forms 1, 4, and 5, and Forms 2 and 3, if applicable, (in Excel), as well as a database with the raw inspection data to WebBGAS.
- Synar Inspection Form: States must upload one blank copy of the inspection form used to record the result of each Synar inspection.
- Synar Inspection Protocol: States must upload a copy of the protocol used to train inspection teams on conducting and reporting the results of the Synar inspections. This document should be different than the Appendix C attached to the Annual Synar Report.

Merchant education and/or training

Incentives for merchants who are in compliance (e.g., nonenforcement compliance checks in which compliant retailers are given positive reinforcement and noncompliant retailers are warned about youth and young adult access laws)

Retailer and compliance work through our funded community coalitions fell into 4 main areas:

Building Capacity for Compliance: Several organizations focus on assisting retailers and municipalities with understanding and complying with tobacco control regulations. Developing a retailer packet to educate retailers about age verification, the 802Quits program, and health risks associated with tobacco use. Working with towns and educating town clerks on licensing and renewal processes, ultimately aiming to bolster their ability to manage tobacco licensing effectively

Direct Outreach to Retailers: Many organizations engage in direct outreach to retailers, providing resources, education, and support for compliance. Installing butlers with 802 Quit information at two grocery stores, reflecting a proactive approach to promoting cessation resources at points of sale. Monitoring Vermont Department of Liquor and Lottery (DLL) compliance data and conducting retail check-ins to address compliance issues related to signage and butt litter receptacles.

Leveraging Community Events and Partnerships: Several organizations utilize community events, partnerships, and third spaces to disseminate information about cessation resources and promote smoke-free environments. Reach out to convenience store owners to provide cessation information for their employees and presented information about retailer density to mayors to encourage compliance. Actively promoting My Life My Quits and 802 Quits at community events and providing these resources to youth-serving partners.

Integrating Cessation and Prevention Efforts: Many organizations are strategically connecting cessation resources with prevention initiatives. Survey tobacco marketing campaigns near schools to create a teen drop-in center that offers cessation support exemplify this integrated approach.

Community education regarding youth and young adult access laws Community coalitions conducted the following strategies to educate around youth and young adult access:

Retailer Education and Compliance: Several organizations engage in activities aimed at educating retailers about compliance with tobacco control laws, including age verification requirements.

Data Collection and Dissemination: Survey tobacco marketing campaigns near schools, which could potentially reveal violations of laws related to advertising near youth-accessible areas. Sharing such data with community members could raise awareness of access law violations and the need for enforcement.

Youth Activism: Promote youth activism against tobacco industry exploitation and support youth participation in Our Voices Xposed (OVX) and Vermont Kids Against Tobacco (VKAT) to contribute to a broader community conversation about access laws.

The Tobacco Control Program funded twelve community tobacco prevention grantees around the state.

The Tobacco Control Program collaborates with the Agency of Education to train and support **35** middle and high chapters of Our Voices Xposed (OVX), Vermont's Youth Tobacco and Nicotine Prevention Initiative, to conduct three major education strategies:

- 1. Educate local decision-makers on the health implications and negative impact of flavored tobacco and nicotine product use
- 2. Inform and educate local decision-makers on the negative impacts tobacco and nicotine use is having in their school communities and on their educational experience
- 3. Carry out local activities that support statewide media campaigns throughout the year.

The Tobacco Program is working with DLL and the Tax to update our retail audit dashboard.

Media use to publicize compliance inspection results

The tobacco control program partners with DLL to share inspection results on their websites and in addition, community tobacco grantees use media to publicize comparison rate results and work with DLL to positively recognize retailers that pass their compliance checks. VDH tobacco program also incorporates the tobacco compliance data into presentations. During this reporting period VDH, DLL and Tax Department worked together to combine data into DLL's reporting platform to provide accessible and comprehensive tobacco enforcement data at the local retailer level combined with sales and store audit data. This will aid understanding and work to reduce the impact of tobacco promotion and discounting at point of sale in Vermont.

Community mobilization to increase support for retailer compliance with youth and young adult access laws

Community coalition grantees continue to work in areas with poor compliance rates and engage with retailers to provide additional education about youth compliance laws, their importance to community health and the impact of tobacco promotion and displays on use among youth. The tobacco control program has had a decrease in funded community coalitions so less of the state has coverage and active work with retailers.

The CounterBalance point of sale education and engagement campaign (http://www.counterbalancevt.com) continues to provide digital messaging and materials for tobacco grantees to address the impact of flavors in tobacco products. In 2023-2024 the focus continues to be on flavors specifically with e-cigarettes. Message packages for VDH's vaping prevention campaign, Unhyped are implemented targeting youth and young adults. VDH staff are members of the Policy and Communication Evaluation study with Rutgers to assess awareness, knowledge and behavior change of substances including tobacco products. The study's objective and data are available at https://www.pacevt.org/. The Tobacco Program, grantees, youth groups and Offices of Local Health also conducted community education.

On the <u>CounterBalance website</u>, there is a section highlighting retailers who have taken steps to stop their sale of tobacco products.

The Tobacco Program facilitates frequent meetings to discuss, plan and implement actions to reduce youth access and illegal sales and promotions. Colleagues from the Attorney General's Office, Department of Liquor and Lottery, Department of Education, Substance Use Programs Prevention, Legal meet with the Health Department quarterly.
